

## **ARBORETUM LEVELS**

A tree is defined as a woody plant with single or multiple trunks capable of growing to a height of fifteen feet (15') or more.

*Level 1* – 30 different species of trees labeled. A map with tree locations is preferred (with TUFC logo), but optional.

*Level 2* – 60 different species of trees labeled. A pamphlet or map showing the locations of the trees must be available for self-guided tours, with TUFC logo.

*Level 3* – 90 different species of trees labeled. A pamphlet or map showing the location of the trees must be available for self-guided tours, with TUFC logo. Part-time staff or volunteers must be available for special tours.

*Level 4* – 120 different species of trees labeled. A pamphlet or map showing the locations of trees must be available for self-guided tours, with TUFC logo. Full-time staff or volunteers must be available for special tours. The arboretum must distribute a newsletter with at least two issues a year to at least 120 persons.

## **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

(3-year period)

- Sites open to the public are preferred, for free or for fee. Special consideration for private sites is available.
- Management practices should include protection from mower & string trimmer damage, staff training, proper mulching, and/or herbicide treatment.
- Plant establishment should exemplify current best management practices for planting, protecting and maintaining trees.
- Tree labels must not be able to damage the tree, and must be obvious and near the tree. We prefer labels on stakes in the ground, but may be hang-tags on limbs, or put on trunks with aluminum nails or screws at readable height. Steel screws or nails are no longer recommended. Spacing-springs are optional, but may become ingrown by bark.
- Trees in or overhanging high-use areas in the arboretum must be in safe condition, and inspected regularly for potential hazards. Take proper arboricultural steps to remedy the hazards.
- Presence of hazard *conditions* will delay certification approval until corrected. NOTE: This is NOT the same as a Hazard Tree Determination.
- The Tennessee Certified Arboretum sign must be posted and maintained.

- All labels must have botanical name (in *italics* or underscoring) and common name. The current edition of Dirr's *Manual of Woody Landscape Plants* is the Style Manual for names and labeling format. Other descriptive information is not required.

-Re-certification is required every 3 years to ensure that the arboretum maintains certification standards.

-Contacting a Certified Arborist to inspect all trees in accessible areas is encouraged before applying.

-Checking with your insurance carrier concerning public use of your property is also encouraged.

- A certification sign: *The Tennessee Urban Forestry Council has confirmed this site as a Certified Arboretum*. A custom sign upgrade is available.

\*This sign must be displayed at all times during the certification period of 3 years. *If stolen or destroyed, it will be replaced at arboretum's expense. Additional and custom signs may be purchased.*

5. Submit payment online to Tennessee Urban Forestry Council (See Fee Schedule). Fee is non-refundable
